

WHO ARE WE?

The Tri-County Regional Planning Commission:

- Established in 1956
- Covers Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham counties
- Publicly funded (Federal, State, local)
- Areas of focus
 - Economic Development
 - Environmental
 - Land Use
 - Transportation
- Coordinates planning and implementation of federally funded transportation projects in the region





WHAT IS THE 2045 METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLAN?



Federally-mandated document

Transportation investment strategy for next 25 yrs. Updated every four years

No MTP = No Federal Funds



Addresses all modes of transportation

Safety Transit
Road Condition & CongestionAir and Rail
Freight Non-Motorized



Uses the most recent data to assess needs and priorities

Population and employment forecasts
Traffic count and travel time studies
Pavement management inventory
Safety/Crash data



MTP must be financially constrained

Revenues must equal expenditures

 - Economic Vitality


Performance Measures

- Established at the national level, followed by states and MPOs developing their own performance targets in support of those measures
- States and MPOs will be required to report on how project selection will help achieve the defined targets
- Tri-County is working with MDOT and our transportation partners to address this requirement

- Increase the safety of the transportation system for all users.
- Increase the security of the transportation system for all users.
- Equitably provide enhancements.
- Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life.
- > Enhance the connectivity of the transportation system.
- Promote efficient system management and operation.
- Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.
- Reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.
- Enhance travel and tourism.






- 42% of non-trunkline federal-aid system is in good or fair condition today (2018)
- 26% of non-trunkline federal-aid system is projected to be in good or fair condition by 2030 with current funding levels and optimal maintenance practices
- To achieve 80% of the system in good/fair condition, an additional \$1.965 billion is required over the next 25 years



ROAD PAVEMENT CONDITION








ROADWAY CAPACITY DEFICIENCIES

- 4.1% of non-trunkline federal-aid system is currently over the 24 hour design capacity (Congested)
- By 2045 7.4% of non-trunkline federal-aid system will be over the 24 hour design capacity (Congested)
- 52 intersections have been identified as needing congestion relief
- To significantly address future congestion a total of \$442,600,000 is needed through 2045

Traffic Crashes


- 15,050 crashes in region in 2017
- 37 fatal crashes in 2017
- Down 11.4% in ten years

Focus Areas

- Distracted Driving
- Intersections
 - 38% of crashes locally
 - Signalization
- Corridors
 - 62% of crashes locally
 - Center turn lanes

NON-MOTORIZED TRANSPORTATION



Existing non-motorized facilities


- 121 miles shared-use path
- 62 miles bicycle lane
- 136 side path
- 385 miles paved shoulders

PASSENGER RAIL

- The Bluewater Passenger Rail
 - One of three Amtrak-operated Michigan routes
 - Nearly 375,000 riders in 2017
 - New East Lansing Amtrak Station opened in 2016

FREIGHT

- Identified freight issues
 - Weight-restricted roads
 - Short line railroad limitations and equipment shortages
 - Preservation of rail corridors and spurs
 - Regional Rail Study
